and two Board members. Officers must come from current Board members or a prior Board member from the last five years. If you are interested in running for any of these positions send your



Your Mission is to Stay Clean!

As we march towards our fall meeting in October, I am asking my fellow techs to think about best practices for decontamination, cleaning and sterilization on mission trips. Many of you have been on mission trips. I would like to know more about how you maintain standards in, sometimes, less than optimal conditions in other countries. In Guatemala, where I have worked on orthopedic missions, we have access to large sterilizers and a small flash sterilizer. However, I wonder if they use regular biological indicators to confirm the effectiveness of their sterilization process.

Some trips may work in ORs that meet the same standards that we hold in the U.S. Others may not. How have your teams worked with those limitations? Decontamination may be done by the techs on the mission similar to how the local staff does theirs. Are there cleaning products that you bring from home to help with your part of the process? Often times the benefits of the procedures performed are so life-changing (an eye surgery allowing a family member to work, an ortho surgery that will let someone with a deformity walk again) that standards lower than ours, but that comply with theirs, outweigh the risks. If we held the same standards we have here in the States could we perform any surgeries? Does it give you pause to perform surgeries on patients when there are fewer quality controls than we have here? All questions to ponder.

So before the fall meeting please think about techniques that you use to ensure the highest possible standards in other countries: decontamination and cleaning, wrapping and sterilization. I would also like anyone who has been on a mission to fill out a survey during our fall conference at Froedtert. I hope to give a presentation about this subject at the National AST meeting next year in Orlando. Thanks for helping out!
